




I raise my hand as I see you coming down the hall toward me. My palm faces outward and I am slowly moving it laterally using short strokes. What am I doing? I am waving a hello at you. I am hopeful that is what you understand I am doing. That gesture means something—you understand it, I understand it, and others we know understand it. Right? I think the answer to that is 'sure; okay; more than likely, at least I think so'. Recently, I have been reading more deeply about the origins of meaning and how humans come to know to know and what and how they come to know to know. That's a lot of 'knows'. When we know something we assume there's truth in it and to it. How we come to know really depends on what we know to be real and that really depends on what we accept as valid and reliable means or ways to know and claim something to be real. The raised waving hand gesture, a hello greeting, for many of us surely means just that. You do it, I do it, we all do it and sooner or later we affirm (validate) that the gestures means 'hello' or 'hey, I see you'. We have come to see the gesture as a reliable way to say 'hello' in a nonverbal way. What if I used the same motion but my palm faced inward? I actually don't know that gesture. For me, it has no meaning. If you did that to me, I might think you had something on your hand and were just trying to shake it off. What's my point in all of this?

As a community of dental hygiene practitioners we come to know our profession by way of knowing what it means to be a dental hygienist. We 'see' in each other something and we understand that something because we know to know to see that something the way we see it and know it. This is a good thing for a profession. It enables a profession to advance united and to accept with hearty appreciation any discourse which comes about when 'gestures' are not understood. This is all part of the evolution of any profession—we aim to be real.





What is it that dental hygienists know to be real? We exist to serve people. We serve people with genuine and positive regard for their being and their needs. We make decisions regarding our dental hygiene actions based on the needs of those whom we serve. Further, that in all that we do (gestures/acts/thoughts/words/deeds) we ensure quality and safety for all. We advocate for oral health/health for all. For some of us, this means stepping outside comfort levels of our own space and being present in and participating in larger system issues which inhibit health for all. Our focus is on health and promoting health. These premises are all real. Okay, they are to me, I believe they are to you—at least I think so. It is not for me to make such claims about our profession as if these were universal truths. I do know that much of our evidence base (akin to gestures) leads me to think so, but again, that is because it is the way I know to know about my profession.

As I continue my own exploration of our profession, its' origin, its' purpose, its' meaning, its' truths, I am looking for universal Truths—that which is real, really. Of course, we only know what is real based on what and how we know it to be real and that as stated earlier depends on meaning 'things' have for us. I invite us all to continue to explore and think about what and how we arrive at meaning of things within dental hygiene—who we are and what we are all about, and further, that we understand each other and that through the gestures of dental hygiene we contribute to the greater good for one and all.

## Executive Director Message








## National Dental Hygienists Week


